# THE OLD PARLIAMENT HOUSE BLUE PRINT FOR A BETTER HEALTH CARE SYSTEM FOR AUSTRALIANS

The following principles and policies were derived from in-depth discussions with 260 informed delegates from a broad range of health organisations. Clinicians, health administrators, economists, politicians and consumers contributed to the development of these conclusions, which represent the majority view.

Contained herein is a suggested mechanism for further development and implementation of the suggested changes using a new collaborative, collegial and bipartisan instrument – a National Health Care Reform Council.



# What principles do Australians wish to have underpin their national health system?

- Universal access in a timely fashion for all Australians to the same high quality service. That access should, in no way, be restricted by an individuals personal financial circumstances.
- Equity of outcome
- Recognition that health care is a social justice issue and a prime determinant of happiness and well being.
- The application of the highest standards of ethics in the allocation of communal resources (tax dollars) for the provision of health.



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
